

## SUNSHINE GUIDE TO JYVASKYLA AND THE LAKE COUNTRY, FINLAND

LOCATION: Jyvaskyla is located in the heart of the lake country of south-central Finland. The city is the capital of the Finnish province of Central Finland, and the seat of an important university. Elevations are around 400 feet above sea level.

COMMENTS: Bright sunshine is likely on 35% of the year's daylight hours. This might range from a low of 8% during the short days of December, to a high of 45% during the long days from May through July. The year's lowest temperature should be close to -24°, and the highest should be near 83°. Sensible afternoon temperatures (the ones you feel) will be a few degrees cooler than actual ones during the warmer months, and about the same as actual ones the rest of the year. During the summer solstice, true dark does not fall, with twilight lasting the four hours or more between sunset and sunrise. During the winter solstice, the sun (when it is visible at all) just barely clears the horizon, then skates along it in the southern sky for a few hours before sinking below it once again for the long winter night. During midwinter, temperatures will drop below zero about one day in four. Lakes and streams are usually frozen and snow-covered from late October through late April.
