SUNSHINE GUIDE TO IQUITOS AND AMAZONIA, PERU

LOCATION: Iquitos is located in the rain forest of the Amazonian lowlands of northeastern Peru. The town is situated on the main channel of the Amazon River, at an elevation of about 340 feet above sea level. Access is by air and by river only, as no roads connect it with the rest of the world.

COMMENTS: Iquitos has an equatorial two-season year. There is the hot, humid, rainier season (October through May); and the hot, humid, less rainy season (June through September). Monotony is the key to the climate in this part of the world. There is very little difference from one month to another in almost any climatic element. The length of the daylight period varies by only a few minutes from one month to another, the hours of sunshine by not much more, the temperature by only two or three degrees. The number of rainy days shows the most variation, but even that is slight. Climatologist have a saying that, "Night is the winter of the tropics.". This does not mean that the nights are cold. They are not. They are usually warm to mild, and the worst they ever get is chilly and damp. What this saying means is that the temperature drop from day to night (16° to 20°) is greater than that from the warmest month to the coolest--about 3°. Night and early morning humidities are usually at saturation. Early morning mists are common when the air movement is light, and fogs are not unusual. When there is no breeze, heavy dews are the rule. Clothing and other items left out overnight to dry will still be wet in the morning.
